

**MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING
OF THE AVON LAKE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL
HELD MAY 9, 2011**

The regular meeting of the Avon Lake Municipal Council was called to order on May 9, 2011 at 7:30 P.M. in the Council Chamber with Council President Zilka presiding.

Mrs. Fenderbosch led the Council, staff, and public in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the April 11, 2011 Council Meeting and the April 18, 2011 rescheduled Council Meeting were approved as prepared and published.

CORRESPONDENCE

A letter was received from Robert Pocock, 400 Community Drive, expressing his objection to the billing practices for soft billing for EMS services.

Kopf Construction forwarded a letter objecting to the telecommunications tower proposed by AT&T for location at Walker Road Park.

The Lorain City Health Department forwarded the 2010 annual report for the City of Avon Lake.

Mrs. Fenderbosch received a letter from a resident on Greenbriar Drive regarding the feeding of deer.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Zuber made the following announcements.

The Recreation Department held a successful senior fair on April 20th at the Avon Lake Public Library.

The Mayor, the Police Chief, Fire Chief, and Chief Utilities Executive met regarding the implementation of the Code Red system in the Utilities Department.

WOW plans to have all installation completed in Avon Lake by the end of July, 2011. The PEG channels will be available to WOW customers by June or July.

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The Mayor attended the vision fair at Independence Village on April 29th.

Arbor Day was celebrated on May 1st at the municipal pool.

On May 6th, the Mayor attended the Ohio Associated Public Safety Directors spring conference.

On May 11th, the Mayor will attend a session on the regional fire study implementation.

On May 15th, the Mayor will attend the Recognition of Excellence ceremony at the High School.

On May 12th, PolyOne will open their innovation center in Avon Lake. The Mayor, along with Team Lorain County, worked with PolyOne to obtain State loans and tax incentives. PolyOne will make a gold class donation for the July 4th Avon Lake Arts Festival.

On May 26th, the Mayor met with Thogus Products. Their business is thriving and 32 new hires were added to the facility last year.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The next Collective Committee meeting is scheduled for May 16th. The next Regular Council Meeting is scheduled for May 23rd.

Council members should let the Clerk know if they are planning to participate in the Memorial Day Parade. The parade is scheduled for Monday May 30th at 10:00 A.M. The parade will start at the north drive of the Avon Lake High School and will proceed north on Avon Belden, left onto Electric, then left onto Glenview, left onto Avon Belden following north to Veterans Memorial Park on Lake Road.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Engineering Department Update was distributed.

Construction at Moore Road and Walker Road continues at the closed intersection; the project is behind schedule due to weather conditions.

The Pin Oak Parkway/Avon Belden Road project is on schedule for completion by the beginning of the 2011/2012 school year; bids have been received and opened.

LAW DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The Law Department Update was distributed.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Mrs. Fenderbosch reported on the following items discussed at the Environmental Committee meeting held May 5, 2011: the donation of sunscreen for the pool; and deer management.

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources has determined that a healthy herd of deer that can be supported by the environment in Avon Lake would consist of no more than 40 deer. Mrs. Fenderbosch stated that a harvesting of deer will probably be recommended by the State.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

A Finance/Audit Committee meeting is scheduled for May 16, 2011 at 6:00 P.M. in the Council Conference Room.

HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. Bucci reported on the following items discussed at the May 2nd Human Resources Committee meeting: Municipal Utilities job descriptions; and civil service testing for the position of Fire Chief.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. O'Donnell reported on the following items discussed at the May 4th Public Service Committee meeting: baseball field maintenance; cell tower regulations; the second phase of the 2011 street program; and monument style mailboxes.

The Public Service Committee recommended street repairs in the amount of \$750,000 due to increasing deterioration of asphalt and concrete streets. The Mayor expressed his concerns with using money from the carry over fund since the City will have to finance costly major projects coming up in the next few years.

A joint meeting between the Public Service Committee and Safety Committee is scheduled for May 23, 2011 at 6:00 P.M.

PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. Kos reported that Time Warner will issue credits to customers who were affected by recent cable freezes and outages. To receive credit, customers must call Time Warner at 877-772-2253.

There will be a public meeting scheduled with representatives from the Illuminating Company regarding recent power outages.

Public Utilities Committee meetings are scheduled for May 12, 2011 at 6:00 P.M. and May 16, 2011 at 6:30 P.M.

SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT

A Safety Committee meeting is scheduled for May 11, 2011 at 7:00 P.M. in the Council Chamber. A joint meeting between the Safety Committee and Public Service Committee is scheduled for May 23, 2011 at 6:00 P.M.

SEWER COMMITTEE REPORT

A joint meeting between the Sewer Committee and Public Service Committee is scheduled for May 17, 2011 at 7:00 P.M. This will be a public meeting for residents who were affected by flooding from recent storms.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. Bucci reported that the Economic Development Committee of Council met on April 21, 2011 and the Economic Development Advisory Board met on April 28, 2011. Based on the two meetings, there was consensus that the City would benefit by having a third party vendor develop a long term economic development plan to be utilized over the next few years.

PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT

Planning Commission is scheduled to meet May 10, 2011. The following items are on the agenda: Lake Breeze Allotment Phase 5 plat; Avon Lake Sheet Metal fence installation; Community Garden site plan revision; and revisions to the Wireless Telecommunication Ordinance.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS REPORT

The Zoning Board of Appeals met on April 26, 2011. An area variance for minimum building setback was approved for property located at 126 Mull Avenue.

RENEWABLE ENERGY TASK FORCE REPORT

The Renewable Energy Task Force is scheduled to meet May 12, 2011 at 6:30 P.M. in the Council Chamber.

CABLE ADVISORY COMMISSION REPORT

Mr. Kos reported on the Avon Lake Facebook page policy discussed at the April 26, 2011 Cable Advisory Commission meeting.

All locally produced public access shows are now available on the Avon Lake PEG channels.

WALKER ROAD AD HOC COMMITTEE REPORT

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The Avon Lake/Bay Village Walker Road Park Ad Hoc Committee met on April 20, 2011 to discuss AT&T's proposal for a cell tower to be located in the park. Discussions are in the very early stages and no decisions have been made.

The Bay Village Soccer League has proposed installation of an irrigation system on the soccer fields at Walker Road Park.

ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS ADVISORY BOARD (EAAB) REPORT

Mrs. Fenderbosch reported on the following items discussed at the May 4, 2011 EAAB meeting: Pride Day activities; the EAAB logo; deer control; and distribution of informational pamphlets at upcoming community events.

AVON LAKE COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

This year's winners of the Citizen of the Year award are Erma Haverback and Mary Pease; the winner of the Project of the Year award is the Peter Miller House. Winners will be recognized at the Kiwanis Club dinner on May 12th.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

Leroy Baker, 158 Mull Avenue, Avon Lake, expressed his concern regarding a liquor license transfer for property located at 153 Lear Road and the proximity of the new location to residential property on the east side of Lear Road. He asked for clarification on the process of a liquor license transfer.

Mr. Zilka explained that a motion is on the agenda to instruct the Clerk of Council to return the form to the Division of Liquor Control indicating whether or not the City requests a hearing in the matter of the liquor license transfer. If the City does not request a hearing, the transfer will go forward immediately. If the City requests a hearing, the transfer will be delayed. The site plan for the new location of the establishment was considered and approved at the April 5, 2011 Planning Commission meeting.

Mr. Reitz stated that the Planning & Zoning Code does not require notification of residents in this matter because the proposed bar is a permitted use in that zoning district. Planning Commission did impose restrictions on the use of the patio regarding limitation of hours of operation; music will not be permitted on the patio at any hour. The parking area met Planning & Zoning Code and ADA requirements.

Planning Commission approved the front location of the patio as opposed to the back of the building to place it further away from residential properties and to make it more visible and easier to patrol.

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Tom Curry, 33379 Lake Road, Avon Lake, owner of Stop 45 Tavern, addressed concerns raised by residents regarding the move of the tavern from 182 Lear Road to 153 Lear Road.

Mr. Rush explained that the City has a certain amount of time to respond to the Division of Liquor Control regarding a hearing request relative to a liquor license transfer. Chief Owad indicated there are no grounds to request a hearing. There have been no problems with the establishment at the current location.

Law Director Kerner stated that liquor licenses have been denied in other communities after a hearing based on testimony from Police Departments. When a hearing is requested, the Liquor Control Board will examine the nature of past incidents and the effect on the future. They do not consider zoning issues. If the Police Chief has indicated there are no grounds for a hearing, it would be very difficult to bring any evidence forward to overcome the Board's approval of the requested transfer.

Mr. Rush pointed out that all liquor licenses are up for review every one or two years.

Mike Liptak, 109 Forest Avenue, Avon Lake, owner of the property where the bar will be located, explained the extensive improvements that will be made to the property to create a buffer zone between the bar and residential properties.

MOTIONS

Mr. O'Donnell moved to authorize the Engineering Department to advertise for bids for replacement of furnaces at the Old Firehouse Community Center and Service Department, and to replace the HVAC system at the Safety Center.

These improvements will be funded by a NOPEC grant the City received for energy conservation projects.

Mr. O'Donnell moved to authorize the Engineering Department to advertise for bids for the second phase of the 2011 Concrete Street Repair Project.

After the first phase of the street program was approved, Council members agreed further concrete street repair is needed and decided to take a more aggressive approach before the streets deteriorate further. Four asphalt streets will also be added. The total estimated cost for the additional streets is \$750,000; approximately \$100,000 is left over from phase one of the street program and will be applied to phase 2.

Mrs. Fenderbosch pointed out that funding for the additional streets was not included in the 2011 budget approved by Council because the extensive deterioration of the streets

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was not evident until after the severe winter and after the budget was approved. She stressed the importance of maintaining the streets and neighborhoods.

Mr. Kos pointed out that this motion is for authorization to advertise for bids only. If bids come back too high, the City has the right to reject the bids and wait for better prices.

Mayor Zuber expressed his concern for funding the expanded street program from carry over funds. He made the following comments. The \$100,000 that was left over from budgeted funds could have been used to pave areas of Orchard Park and most of Fredricksburg, which is one of the worst streets. He pointed out that the expense for the additional streets will diminish the carry over funds. Two million dollars has been allotted for street repair this year which will result in a 31% decrease in the carry over funds, taking the reserve down to \$4 million. The Mayor expressed his concern because costly mandated sewer projects are scheduled for the next few years. Last year the City was able to balance the budget because of an unexpected inheritance tax which came to the City. The State budget which passed the House of Representatives has eliminated inheritance tax as of 2013. Local government funding will be cut by 28% this year, which means the City will receive \$84,000 less than what was budgeted, and \$250,000 less than what the City will receive next year. Every year, the City will receive less. So far this year, the City has collected \$650,000 more in income taxes than last year, but \$750,000 was budgeted and that amount hasn't been reached yet. A \$1.2 million deficit is still projected over the \$1.2 million expenditure from the general fund.

Mr. Zilka stated that the streets being added to the street program will deteriorate even further and will require even more repair work if they are not taken care of now and the City will still have to deal with the many upcoming projects. If the bids are too high and the projected revenue coming into the City falls, Council may reconsider the project. Residents expect to have their streets maintained.

Mr. O'Donnell stated that he shares the Mayor's concern with the budget, but the time has come to make an investment in the street program; it will only cost more to have the streets repaired in the future.

Mr. Rush moved to instruct the Clerk of Council to return the form to the Division of Liquor Control in the matter of a liquor license transfer stating the City of Avon Lake does not request a hearing.

This liquor license transfer request is from Stewcur Enterprises dba Stop 45 at 182-84 Lear Road to Stewcur Enterprises dba Stop 45 at 153 Lear Road. The Police Chief indicated there are no grounds to request a hearing.

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Mr. Meiners stated that he will support the motion with reservations. He has concerns with the parking and the possibility of parking overflow which may infringe on surrounding businesses.

Mr. Kos stated that he will vote in favor of the motion, but has reservations based on a similar establishment in Ward IV which had noise incidents on the patio. He said he does not agree with the patio hours of operation.

Mrs. Fenderbosch stressed the importance of a business owner being a good neighbor. She explained that the parking requirements are based on the building capacity. The Fire Marshall determined that the parking capacity at the new Stop 45 location is adequate.

Mayor Zuber stated that Mr. Liptak and Mr. Curry have agreed to work with residents in the area who have expressed concerns.

Mr. Zilka stated that Mr. Curry has operated an establishment which abuts a residential area for nine years without problems.

Mr. Zilka moved to authorize the Finance Director to issue a refund to the Avon Lake Community Garden Committee in the amount of \$50.00 for inspection fees.

The Community Garden Committee requested the refund for inspection fees so the money could be used toward the purchase of supplies. Council previously granted the organization a refund for Planning Commission fees. The Community Garden will be open to the entire community and will have educational benefits.

LEGISLATION

Third Reading:

Temporary Legislation #9792, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 1240.06 OF THE PLANNING & ZONING CODE, ENTITLED ACCESSORY USE REGULATIONS, was read by title only.

Mrs. Fenderbosch moved for passage of Temporary Legislation #9792. The proposed amendments have had lengthy discussion regarding the size of gardens, the location of gardens and wildlife fencing, and the timetable permitting wildlife fencing. Council has

expressed concerns over this part of the proposed amendments. Other proposed amendments address the definition of a fence to include trellises and other structures placed to accomplish fencing or division of premises for confinement, screening, partitioning, or decoration. Revisions also clarify height, setbacks, orientation, required visibility at street intersections, nuisances, and temporary fencing. Mrs. Fenderbosch explained that these amendments were generated by complaints from residents. She stated that she is recommending that Council reject the recommendation from Planning Commission based on the garden and wildlife fencing amendments.

Mr. Rush stated that there are components of the proposed amendments that he supports, but feels the issue of gardens and wildlife fencing needs more consideration.

Mayor Zuber recommended that Council and Planning Commission have a joint meeting to address the issues.

Mr. O'Donnell recommended that Council forward a written statement to Planning Commission explaining their reasons for rejecting the proposed amendments. He stated that, as gardens are becoming more popular as food sources, it is important to address issues surrounding them.

Mr. Bucci stated that, since this issue will most likely be referred back to Planning Commission, he asked the Zoning Administrator to address invisible fencing.

Mr. Kos asked that the joint meeting between Planning Commission and Council be televised as all Council meetings are televised. Mayor Zuber explained that it would be a Work Session between the two groups at a regular Planning Commission meeting and further stated that it would be an issue since Planning Commission voted not to have their meetings televised. Mr. Kos stated that he would respect the decision of Planning Commission.

Law Director Kerner stated that Planning Commission did vote against televising their meetings, and further stated that a Work Session would be more appropriate than a joint meeting.

Mr. O'Donnell moved for passage of Temporary Legislation #9811. The Service Director recommended the purchase of a heavy duty truck lift through the State Purchasing Program. Heavy Lift Systems submitted the low quote of \$34,068. Since the equipment became inoperable after the budget was approved, the funding for this purchase will come from various line items in the Service Department budget.

Temporary Legislation #9812, A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 25, AFFIRMING THE VALUE AND IMPORTANCE OF THE MORTGAGE INTEREST DEDUCTION, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY, was read by title only.

The United States House and Senate committees are currently holding hearings regarding different perspectives on crafting a new tax system. Mrs. Fenderbosch stated that changes in the mortgage interest deduction would have an adverse effect on the entire housing market, potentially lowering home values and slowing sales. Each change in the mortgage interest deduction opens the door for full elimination and could have a broad effect on local economies and jobs.

Temporary Legislation #9813R, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CODIFIED ORDINANCE CHAPTER 240.03, ENTITLED MUNICIPAL ANIMAL WARDEN, was read by title only.

The Police Chief recommended certain changes in the Animal Warden ordinance to simplify the language and bring it up to date with the duties of the Animal Warden. The amendment will also allow the Police Chief more flexibility.

The Finance Committee recommended a \$5000 annual stipend to Joseph Reitz for acting as the Contract Administrator effective June 1, 2011. The amount will be prorated. A job description is being developed.

Temporary Legislation #9816, AN ORDINANCE AWARDDING A CONTRACT FOR THE AVON BELDEN ROAD/PIN OAK PARKWAY TRAFFIC SIGNAL PROJECT AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY, was read by title only.

This and the following three revised job descriptions will more accurately reflect the duties associated with the positions and were approved and recommended by the Municipal Utilities Board. After the ordinances are adopted, the Civil Service Commission will take the necessary action to have the positions removed from Civil Service classification. The Civil Service Commission determined the positions are too difficult to fill under the Civil Service process.
