The culvert design has been finalized and the contractor has been hired. However, the existing gas line needs to be relocated and placed under the new structure. The project is on hold until the gas company is able to move the gas line. All Moore Road businesses will be accessible throughout the closure. Thank you for your patience!

- Make certain there is at least one properly installed and functioning smoke detector on each level of your home. We also recommend detectors for each sleeping area.
- Every home should have Carbon Monoxide (CO) detectors, ideally one on each level. If only one detector is to be used, the location is to be near the sleeping areas. Carbon Monoxide is produced by any natural gas fueled appliance, wood burning and natural gas fire places, BBQ grills, etc. Even if your home is all-electric but has an attached garage, we recommend installing a CO detector.
- Both smoke and CO detectors should be tested monthly. They have a service life of 10 years, and should be

replaced even though the audible alarm can still be activated.

- Batteries need to be replaced twice per year (when clocks are reset for daylight saving). Even if the detectors in your house are hard wired into the electrical system they probably have a battery in the event of a power outage.
- Develop and practice a home fire escape plan with the whole family.
- Fall and winter are right around the corner and we recommend that furnaces and fire places including chimneys be cleaned and inspected.

Family Highlights Centuries of Service in Memorial Day Parade

This year's Memorial Day events in Avon Lake included ceremonies at American Legion Post 211 and the Lake Shore Cemetery, followed by a parade that began at Avon Lake High School and continued to Veterans' Memorial Park. Mayor Greg Zilka, state and area representatives and many city groups and organizations took part in the day's events.

In the parade was a "Service Through the Centuries" float by Cindy McGuire and her family.

"We wanted to participate in the celebration of Avon Lake's Bicentennial in some way, and a float in the parade honoring past and present military personnel would be our way to do that." said McGuire. "While we listed ancestors and family members, we were honoring all those who served through America's history."

Cindy's family has had a family member serve in the military during almost every conflict in the last 200 years, including each war the United States of America has fought in, from the Revolutionary War until modern day, except for the Korean War. McGuire found that family ancestor Joel Titus fought in the Revolutionary War, Anson Titus fought in the War of 1812; Philip Beard in the Civil War; Cecil Titus in WWI; Chuck and Glen Beard in WWII; Dale Beard in Vietnam era and beyond; and currently Natalie Christofferson is a Marine.

According to McGuire, and the family research she was able to do, her ancestors Joseph and Hannah Moore settled in the Avon Lake area in the 1830s, their daughter Hannah Moore married Anson Titus and his granddaughter, Malinda Titus, married Charles Beard in 1884. Those were the distant relatives and great grandparents of the "Service Through the Centuries" group and were early settlers in Avon Lake.

Many members of the family currently live in Avon Lake, including Bruce Beard, Sue Gerbick, Karen Pfeiffer, Diane Cover and McGuire. They also had family visit from Michigan to celebrate Memorial Day and the Avon Lake Bicentennial.

The "Service Through the Centuries" float was made with a trailer from Wolf Schindler. Bruce Beard built a frame for it and Gerbick, Pfeiffer, Cover and McGuire finished decorating it with banners and decorations made by some students from Lorain High School.

McGuire said the family had a wonderful time participating in the Memorial Day parade and had fun representing her ancestors, as well as honoring all service members. Councilman Rob James had a vision to create a Bicentennial Monument with a time capsule. The concept grew into what is now known as the Bicentennial Garden. It flourished through the partnership of Heritage Avon Lake, Avon Lake Historic Preservation Commission, the Administration and Council.

The Garden will be located in Miller Road Park on the Peter Miller Museum estate. The overall concept will transcend time using historic native plants, sandstone and other natural products. Smaller signs with historic bullet points will be placed along the path as one walks into the garden with a larger sign on a large sandstone boulder. Benches will be placed within the Garden for people to sit for a while, contemplate and enjoy the beautiful views.

Construction of the hardscape will begin this autumn with plantings installed next spring.



New School Bus Legislation

On August 26, 2019, the Avon Lake City Council unanimously passed legislation increasing the penalties on those that illegally pass stopped school buses. The new law allows the Court the discretion to fine the offender up to \$750, suspend their driver's license and/or impose a sentence of up to 30 days in jail.

It is believed that Avon Lake is the first community in the region, if not the state, to increase penalties on this very serious and potentially deadly violation. City Council took this step after discussions with the police department, Superintendent of the schools and the director of busing for the city schools. All agreed that the safety of our children is paramount and this was needed to combat the rise in illegal bus passings.

Residents of Avon Lake, please remember that the rules of the road say that if a school bus is stopped and its red flashing stop sign has been extended, STOP!!!! Saving yourself 30 seconds of time to illegally pass a bus is not worth possibly striking and severely injuring a child. If you illegally pass now, you could end up with thirty days in jail to think about your actions.
